He was married in 1852 and had seven children. Some of the lines in <u>Goodspeeds</u> <u>History of Franklin, Jefferson,</u> Washington, Crawford & Gasconade

<u>Counties</u> state, "Capt. Henry Souders, one of the most prominent citizens of Crawford County. Capt. Soudres is a member of the Masonic fraternity, and has held the office of justice of the peace for sixteen consecutive years."

He is buried in the Gibson Cemetery in Jake's Prairie, Crawford County, Missouri.

There are stories that the old timers used to repeat that refer to him as a horse thief. They state that he used his position during the war in order to take advantage

# **BOYS IN BLUE**

Captain Henry Souders Company G, 34<sup>th</sup> Enrolled Missouri Militia.

Company G, 34<sup>th</sup> Enrolled Missouri Militia was organized in Gasconade County, Missouri on 25 August 1862. They were ordered into active service 27 April 1863 and relieved from active service on 27 May 1863 by General Crawford.

Captain Souders is the great, great, great, great Grandfather of Gary L. Scheel who is now serving as commander of the Grant Camp. Captain Souders was born on 11 June 1832 in Indiana and died 13 Jan 1910 near Oak Hill, Missouri. His great Grandfather Jacob Sowder was a Revolutionary War soldier who served in the 4<sup>th</sup> Virginia Light Foot (Continental Line) and saw service at Valley Forge.
